From 1995-2002, I also taught courses and seminars on "Health Law," "Managed Care," "Assisted Suicide," and "Law and Medicine" at the Cornell Law School. In the spring of 2002, I taught a new course for the Biology and Society Program on "Biotechnology and the Law." In my later career at the Law School, I taught "Health Law" and "Legislation." Lastly, over the years I also gave occasional guest lectures in courses at Cornell's Medical College, College of Veterinary Medicine, and the Department of Biology in the College of Arts and Sciences.
